Agency Description Act Number 554 of the Louisiana State Legislature, in the year 1968 as amended, created the Louisiana State Racing Commission (LSRC), vested with the power to promulgate rules, regulations and conditions under which all horse racing and related wagering is conducted under the commission's jurisdiction within the State of Louisiana. The LSRC is an agency within the Executive Department of the Louisiana State Government and consists of thirteen members appointed by the governor who serve at the pleasure of the governor. Annual funding in fiscal year 2017 is \$12,262,662.

Agency Vision The LSRC will continue to promote and regulate high quality thoroughbred and quarter horse racing in the State of Louisiana with available self-generated revenues in compliance with statutes, by encouraging forceful and honest state wide control of horse racing for the public health, safety, and welfare.

Agency Mission Statement **To supervise, regulate, and enforce all statutes and regulations concerning horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering for live horse racing on track, off track, and by simulcasts; to collect and record all taxes due to the State of Louisiana; to safeguard the participants of racing; to safeguard the assets of the LSRC; and to perform administrative and regulatory requirements by operating the LSRC activities including annual budget formulation and execution, regulatory and veterinary daily activities and supervision, and promotion of horse breeding in Louisiana.**

Agency Philosophy Horse racing has been a major sport and entertainment industry in Louisiana from the earliest days of our state. Regulations and controls are necessary to approve racing days to maintain fair competition in the state according to high standards of operations. Racing activities must be regulated and supervised daily to protect the health and safety of the horses, jockeys, and public from unsafe, unsanitary, corrupt and illegal activities. The LSRC also protects the horse racing industry in Louisiana by maintaining proper stability, compliance with statues, honest competition, and employment in a highly competitive gaming environment. The LSRC must provide regulatory legal controls to reduce risks to the entire billion-dollar annual horse racing industry, which has a major impact on the daily economy in Louisiana.

Agency Goal The goal of the LSRC Horse Racing Program is to provide efficient, effective leadership, supervision, regulation and administrative management and support necessary to carry out the mission of regulatory and administrative functions of the LSRC concerning horse racing, including payment of breeder awards and supervision of video poker pass through purse funds. The goals of the LSRC are part of the State Outcome Goal of "Transparent, Accountable, and Effective Government." The specific goals are:

- I. that racing associations conduct live horse race meetings which are approved by the LSRC and which are operated by responsible management approved by the LSRC according to statutes;
- II. that every owner and/or trainer seeking to enter a horse in competition is a person of good character and of financial responsibility;
- **III.** that every horse appearing in a race is the animal he is represented to be on the racing program (horses are identified by registration papers and unique tattoo number) and is carrying the correct weight as assigned by the track handicapper;
- IV. that every horse race run represents a true competitive effort by every participating horse and rider;
- V. that no rider during the running of a horse race commits any act that would unfairly tend to make the race anything other than a true competitive test;
- VI. that every horse is physically fit to race;
- VII. that no one responsible for the custody of a competing horse has administered any prescribed medication to the competing animal within a specified time prior to the race;
- VIII. that every racing association is doing its utmost to provide the spectator public, the horses and their attendants necessary and adequate facilities to accomplish its mission;

- IX. that wagering facilities, management and employees of racing associations and the LSRC are of an order to inspire confidence of the patrons in the way this feature of the sport is conducted;
- X. that breeder awards paid by the Breeder Organizations from statutory state funds earned by the LSRC are reimbursed timely to promote the thoroughbred and quarter horse breeding industry in Louisiana and thus to supply sufficient horses to fill races.

LSRC Executive Administrative Activity

Budget amount in FYE 2016/17 - **\$1,125,187** annually

Activity Authorization Louisiana Revised Statutes, Chapter 4, Racing Parts 1 and 2, Horse Racing, Section 141 et. seq. Withholds from taxes collected on parimutuel wagering, admissions, occupational licenses, fines, forfeited appeal fees, examination fees, etc.

Activity Mission Statement The basic mission is included above in detail. The mission of the Executive Administrative Division is to operate the LSRC domicile office in New Orleans, LA and to perform all general administrative activities necessary for the LSRC to function daily on a regular basis, including scheduling LSRC public meetings and working with the committees of the LSRC.

Activity Goal The goal of the Executive Administrative Activity is to plan, supervise, budget, pay, file and schedule all racing activities and to effectively and efficiently work with the Racing Associations and organizations, and the public through efficient use of self generated funds, cooperation and communications within the normal monthly and annual business cycles to create a calendar of live race days and to schedule public and committee meetings to review and decide on legal cases before the LSRC and other management issues.

Activity Description The Executive Administrative Activity supervises and operates all of the LSRC administrative activities throughout the State of Louisiana including human resources, hiring, training, scheduling work assignments, preparing and executing budgets under the supervision of the Fiscal Director and fiscal impact reports, purchasing and paying for supplies, contracting, conducting public meetings, scheduling and collecting fees for tests and/or fines, processing all travel vouchers, maintaining regulations and files, maintaining a complete computer system on a network and Oracle data base, etc.

The LSRC Executive Administrative Activity publishes a manual of statutes and rules, as well as a racing calendar, and all information on the LSRC website, in addition to processing legislative fiscal notes and coordination with the state fiscal and budget offices, legislators, and the public.

Activity Objective The objective is to maintain horse racing activities as a successful going concern in compliance with statutes, operating according to an approved annual budget, and performing its mission through the use of experienced management, trained employees, computer technology and available self generated resources in a changing work environment with heavy competition in the gaming industry and horse racing in other states, technology advances, the economy, and changes in statutes and reporting requirements. The LSRC constantly promotes best practices and monitors work performance to continue to achieve outstanding work and to avoid duplication of work through supervision, strong internal controls, careful review of budget execution, and analytic review on a daily and business cyclical basis.

Outcome Horse racing in Louisiana continue to be a successful public function authorized by the state and that the business of horse racing with parimutuel wagering continues on a high plane and that the industry continues to be a major economic impact to the State of Louisiana through employment opportunities, licensing, entertainments, tourism, wagering and simulcast, at the state and local level of the economy.

Horse/Racing, Licensing and Regulation Activity

Budget amount in FYE 2016/17 - **\$3,487,944 annually**

Activity Authorization Louisiana Revised Statutes, Chapter 4, Racing, Part 1 and 2, Horse Racing, Section 141 et. seq. Withholds from taxes collected on parimutuel wagering, admissions, occupational licenses, fines, forfeited appeal fees, examination fees, etc. are collected. Funding is self-generated.

Activity Mission Statement The basic mission is outlined above in detail. The Licensing and Regulation Division's mission is to regulate the operations of all horse racing activities in Louisiana including operation of the on-site LSRC field offices at each track, performing all licensing and regulatory functions for the LSRC which are necessary to successfully control eligibility of people and horses to work and/or compete in horse racing in Louisiana, to promote and maintain safe working conditions for riders and horses, and to collect all State of Louisiana self-generated revenue from pari-mutuel wagering, attendance taxes, licenses, fines, and test fees.

Activity Goal The goal of the Horse Racing, Licensing and Regulation Activity is to plan, supervise, license, test, provide stewards' rulings, budget and collect revenues, conduct security inspections, maintain official files, and to monitor all racing activities effectively and efficiently while working daily with the racing associations and the public; to provide an on-site office during all live meetings and to testify at scheduled LSRC public meetings before the LSRC.

Activity Description The LSRC Licensing and Regulatory Division maintains a seasonal on-site office during all live racing seasons at all race tracks in the State of Louisiana to issue licenses, process records and horse papers through an on line computer database daily and to perform human and equine drug tests, and other security details. A State Steward is assigned to the field office at each live racetrack during the racing season to validate the results of each race and to issue decisions and rulings for the LSRC. The Assistant Executive Director and the State Stewards maintain constant unannounced surveillance of all racing activities

for equine or human drug use and/or alcohol, as well as, other unlawful activities such as electrical devices, which may be used to influence the outcome of a race.

The LSRC Licensing and Regulatory Division supervises and operates all licensing activities at seasonal field offices throughout the State of Louisiana and at the domicile including hiring, training, scheduling work assignments, preparing purchasing requisitions, maintaining files in Oracle database on line, receiving/recording payments, issuing licenses annually, handling stewards' decisions on all racing related issues, verifying and monitoring worker's compensation insurance for trainers, guarding the winning horses after each race, insuring proper chain of custody for all human and equine samples and performing security services and working with local police to protect the integrity of horse racing.

The on-site auditors collect and audit self-generated revenue daily. The Chief Auditor and the auditors also provide input to the Executive Director and Fiscal Director in preparation of the LSRC annual budget of the self-generated revenues and they audit the annual budget execution for all LSRC statutory self-generated revenues and annually appropriated video poker pass through funds.

Racing associations submit an annual opinion audit by a CPA and annually apply for live thoroughbred and quarter horses race days.

Activity Objective The objective is to maintain a successful, honest, controlled and regulated racing environment with healthy horses through efficient use of resources and the use of technology in a changing work environment caused by heavy competition in the gaming industry in Louisiana and the USA, technology advances, and changes in cyclical racing schedules.

Performance Indicators

- Inputs Applications from individuals participating in racing are received for licensing daily. Drug tests are conducted. Fees and pari-mutuel taxes are received and deposited daily. Security checks are made on employees, horses and grounds unannounced.
- Outputs Licenses are processed and issued. Applications are verified for completeness, accuracy, eligibility, and possible illegal activities. Various reports of fees received for licenses, fines, etc. are prepared and reconciled. Reports and records of horse health and racing

injuries are maintained. Licenses are mandatory and all racing participants while on duty must wear badges. Stewards make decisions regarding placing of horses at each race and act on illegal activities noted at race tracks with disciplinary action and/or fines when appropriate.

- Outcomes Racing is regulated and conducted successfully on schedule and funds and operations are according to budget and normal work schedules within time deadlines. Safety of human and equine participants is improved. Public support and perception for the sport of horse racing is improved.
- Efficiency Expenses and operations are within 5% of budget. Any variance, which is considered critical, is reviewed and a decision is made to correct the problem.
- Quality Work is progressing normally based on historical basis and within budget. Internal controls are strong. National best practices are followed whenever possible.
- Outcome Horse racing operates successfully with public support and confidence within regulations and racing issues are settled in a formal legal environment.

Horse Racing and Breeder Activity

Budget amount in FYE 2016/17 - includes \$2,956,955 annual statutory video poker device purse supplements pass through funds and \$2,180,613 from the annual budget from self-generated funds for reimbursement of thoroughbred and quarter horse breeder and stallion awards for Louisiana bred horses and OTB breeder awards and OTB payments to the Board of Regents as required by statutes

Activity Authorization Louisiana Revised Statutes, Chapter 4, Racing Part 1 and 2, Horse Racing, Section 141 et. seq. Withholds from taxes collected on parimutuel wagering, admissions, occupational licenses, fines, forfeited appeal fees, examination fees, etc. for breeder awards and fees from R.S.4:218A for the OTB breeder awards and payments to the Board of Regents

Video Poker Pass Through Funds- Authorized by R.S. 33:4862.11, Para 4852.11 (1994).

Activity Mission Statement The mission of the Breeder Activity is to reimburse thoroughbred and quarter horse breeder awards from LSRC self-generated funds as provided by statutes and based upon detailed requests for reimbursement of individual breeder awards from the Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeder Association (LTBA) and the Louisiana Quarter Horse Breeder Association (LQHBA).

Activity Goal The goal of the Breeder Awards Activity is to audit self generated funds available throughout the year to reimburse the LTBA and LQHBA for payment of individual breeder awards as authorized by statutes. The LSRC also pays the off track breeder (OTB) awards directly to the Breeder Organizations out of self generated pari-mutuel revenue from OTB activities.

The goal of the Video Poker Pass Through Purse Funds Activity is to effectively schedule out and plan the budget and disbursements of these appropriated purse funds and to process withdrawals of funds as authorized and to complete audits. Funds are requested by the Breeder Organizations during the fiscal year according to regulations and approved for disbursement by the LSRC Executive Director. Each fiscal year 2/3 of the total appropriation of Video Poker Purse Funds are disbursed to the racetracks based on the number of live thoroughbred race days in the preceding calendar year. The thoroughbred purse funds are disbursed by the LSRC upon requests from the LTBA based on condition books from the racetracks and approved by the LSRC Executive Director the LQHBA receives 1/3 of the total annual appropriation of Video Poker Appropriated Purse Funds for quarter horse races. These funds are disbursed upon requests from the LQHBA for quarter horse purses at the racetracks based on the related condition book as authorized by statutes and also approved the LSRC Executive Director.

Activity Description The Breeders Award Activity is based on LSRC selfgenerated revenues and on the amount wagered in Louisiana. Thoroughbred breeder awards are paid directly by the LTBA to breeders of winning horses (first, second, and third). These funds are earned for reimbursement of thoroughbred breeder awards by a statutory formula of the larger of \$700,000 or 3/10 of 1% of total wagers. The total wagers are verified and compiled into monthly reports by the LSRC auditors. The amount of annual funds for reimbursement for quarter horse breeder awards is fixed by statute at \$800,000 payable during the fiscal year of earned LSRC self generated funds for reimbursement to the LQHBA for payments to breeders of winning horses (first, second and third) and eligible Louisiana QH stallions.

Off track wagering (OTB) breeder awards (approximately \$250,000 annual) are paid to the breeder organizations by the LSRC at the rate of 14% of total LSRC pari-mutuel revenue earned from off track wagers. The amount of OTB wagers is calculated and compiled monthly by the LSRC auditors.

The LSRC is directed to pay 33% of the OTB self- generated revenue to the Board of Regents.

Activity Objective The objective is to correctly calculate and to make reimbursements and payments during the fiscal year from self generated funds earned for individual thoroughbred and quarter horse breeder awards and for OTB breeder awards according to statutes.

Outputs **Funds for individual thoroughbred and quarter horse breeder awards are reimbursed from LSRC self generated revenue as they are earned and available during the fiscal year to the breeder organizations according to statutes.**

Payments of OTB breeder awards are made quarterly to the LTBA and LQHBA at 14% of LSRC OTB revenue according to statutes.

- Outcomes The horse breeding industry in Louisiana is promoted and/or better quality horses will be available to race in a safer environment in Louisiana. This will result in employment opportunities and a successful and growing breeding and racing industry. The availability of a sufficient number of horses to race on each approved race day is critical to a successful race meet.
- Efficiency Income and payments are with-in budget authorization.

Quality Calculations and transfers of funds are accurate and timely.

Horse/Racing, Veterinary Activity

Budget amount in FYE 2016/17 - \$2,956,955 annually

Activity Authorization Louisiana Revised Statutes, Chapter 4, Racing, Part 1 and 2, Horse Racing, Section 141 et. seq. Withholds from taxes collected on parimutuel wagering, admissions, occupational licenses, fines, forfeited appeal fees, examination fees, etc. Funding is self generated.

Statutory dedications are included in funding effective from FYE 2011 and beyond for Veterinary activities concerning all veterinary medical issues for the LSRC. The main concerns are the health and safety of active racing participants, both human and equine, by close and careful medical examination and records of racehorses and equine related activities and diseases.

Activity Mission Statement The basic mission is outlined above in detail. The Veterinarian Activity's mission is to perform all examinations and testing of horses racing in Louisiana in compliance with the Association of Racing Commissioners International (ARCI) National Model Rules. These examinations and tests are necessary to successfully control eligibility of horses to race and/or to compete in horse racing in Louisiana, to promote and maintain safe working conditions for riders and horses.

Activity Goal The goal of the Veterinarian Activity is to plan and supervise all veterinary activities of horse racing in Louisiana with pre race exams of all horses scheduled to race.

Activity Description State Veterinarians examine horses scheduled for racing in pre race exams, guarding the winning horses after each race, insuring proper chain of custody for equine samples.

The Equine Medical Director supervises the State Veterinarians at on-site races at Louisiana racetracks during the annual racing cycle based on approved live race days by the LSRC. The agenda includes daily pre-race examination of all horses scheduled to race, medication rules, racing injury reporting program, contagious disease preventions, and scratch rules. The Veterinarian Program is funded annually partly by appropriations from the State Gaming Control Fund which receives state earnings from slot machines at all race tracks in Louisiana. Activity Objective The objective is to maintain a safe, successful, honest, controlled and regulated racing environment with healthy horses through efficient use of resources and the use of technology in a changing work environment caused by heavy competition in the gaming industry in Louisiana, technology advances, and changes in schedules.

Performance Indicators

Inputs	Pre race examinations and equine drug tests are performed.

- Outputs Horses who are physically unfit to race are scratched from the race programs. Drug tests are monitored for results and positive tests are subject to the disciplinary procedures of the Racing Commission rules.
